Saints of the Week

Memorial of St Albert the Great, Bishop, Doctor - 15th November

St Albert the Great (1206-80) was born in the Swabian town of Lauingen (Germany) and studied at Padua and Paris. He became a Dominican and taught theology; his pupils included St Thomas Aquinas. In 1260 he was appointed bishop of Regensburg but resigned two years later and returned to academic pursuits. The encyclopaedic breadth of his writings earned him the title of 'Universal Doctor' and patron of students of the natural sciences.



Memorial of St Margaret of Scotland, Queen - 16th November

St Margaret (1046-93) was the grandaughter of King Edmund Ironside of England but was born while in exile in Hungary. In 1070 she married King Malcolm III of Scotland and had eight children, three of whom reigned as Kings of Scotland, including St David I. Remarkable for her piety and works of charity, St Margaret co-founded Dunfermline Abbey and organised ferries at North and South Queensferry for pilgrims crossing the Firth of Forth on the way to St Andrews. She is the secondary Patron of Scotland.



Memorial of St Gertrude, Virgin - 16th November

St Gertrude (1256-c. 1302) was born in Eisleben (Germany) and joined the Benedictine convent at Helfta. She showed great talent in her philosophical and literary studies but is best known for her mystical writings. She had a marked devotion to the Holy Souls in Purgatory and to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, which later developed into its modern form with the visions of St Margaret Mary.



Memorial of St Edmund of Abingdon, Bishop - 16th November

St Edmund (c.1175-1240) was born in Abingdon (England) and studied at Oxford and Paris. He lectured for a time at Oxford, before becoming a treasurer at Salisbury and then, in 1233, Archbishop of Canterbury. With the help of a strong team, which included St Richard of Chichester, he did much to reform ecclesiastical discipline and defend the rights of the Church. He died in 1240 at Soisy (France), while on his way to Rome, and was buried at nearby Pontigny. He



gave his name to the Order of St Edmund, founded at Pontigny in 1843, and Colleges at Oxford, Cambridge and Old Hall Green.

Memorial of St Hilda of Whitby, Religious - 17th November

St Hilda (614-680) was born into the Northumbrian royal family and baptised by St Paulinus a the age of thirteen. She eventually decided to enter the religious life, aged thirty-three, and became superior of the double monastery (men and women) at Hartlepool. She later moved as Abbess to the double monastery at Whitby, where she hosted the famous Synod in 663-64 which reconciled the differences between



Roman and Irish usages. St Hilda died in 680 and her supposed relics were in later years claimed

by Glastonbury and Gloucester.

Memorial of St Hugh of Lincoln, Bishop - 17th November

St Hugh (c.1140-1200) was born at Avalon in Burgundy (France) and first entered the Augustinian Canons, before moving to the stricter Carthusian Order. After ten years at the Grande Chartreuse, he was sent to Witham in Somerset (England) to take charge of the recently-founned Charterhouse there. In 1186 he was reluctantly appointed Bishop of Lincoln and proved to be a holy and reforming pastor. He died a this residence at Lincoln's Inn, London, in 1200 and his symbol is a swan, a reference to the swan of Stowe that became his companion and guarded him as he slept.



Memorial of St Elizabeth of Hungary, Queen - 17th November

St Elizabeth (1207-31), daughter of King Andrew II of Hungary, was born at either Sárospatak (Hungary) or Bratislava (then Hungary, now in Slovakia). She married Ludwig IV, Landgrave of Thuringia (Germany), and had three children. St Elizabeth was widowed at the age of twenty and devoted herself to the poor and the sick. She founded a hospital at Marburn and was a Third Order Franciscan.



Dedication of the Basilicas of Ss Peter and Paul, Apostles - 18th November

The dedication of these two major basilicas allows us to express our communion with the Church in Rome. Both basilicas were completed in the fourth century and commemorated the two great Apostles: St Peter's on the Vatican Hill was built above the tomb of the first Pope and St Paul's outside the Walls was likewise erected over the final resting place of the Apostle of the Gentiles.

Vatican News

Pope to visit Cyprus and Greece in early December

The Holy See Press Office officially announced on Friday that the Pope will embark on a 5-day Apostolic Journey to Cyprus and Greece in early December. The visit will see him spend 2-4 December in Nicosia, the capital of Cyprus. He will then head to Greece on 4 December, visiting Athens and Lesbos until 6 December, when he



will return to Rome. According to the Holy See Press Office, the Pope is undertaking the Apostolic Journey to Cyprus and Greece upon the invitation of the countries' civil authorities and Bishops' Conferences. The full schedule of the visit will be released in due course.

Second papal visit to Cyprus: Pope Francis' visit to Cyprus will see him follow in the footsteps of his predecessor, Benedict XVI, who made an Apostolic Journey to the Mediterranean island nation in 2010. The vast majority of Cypriots identify as Greek Orthodox, but the nation has a vibrant Catholic community of around 11,000 faithful. Many of them trace their roots back Crusaders who settled there after the fall of Jerusalem in the 12th century. St. Paul stopped off in Cyprus in the first century AD, and converted the island's Roman governor Sergius Paulus to Christianity. Tradition holds that St. Lazarus, whom Jesus raised from the dead, fled to

Cyprus fearing persecution and was ordained as Bishop of Kition by the Apostles Barnabas and Paul. His tomb lies under the Byzantine-era church of Saint Lazarus in the southern city of Larkaka.

Returning to Lesbos: The Pope's trip to Greece will be his second, following his 1-day visit to the Greek island of Lesbos in 2016. During that trip, Pope Francis visited the refugee camp of Moria with the Patriarch of Constantinople, Bartholomew I, and the Archbishop of Athens and All Greece, Ieronymos II. He flew back to the Vatican with 3 families of Syrian refugees, offering asylum to all 12 of them, including 6 children. The Moria Refugee Camp was closed down in September 2020, after a fire broke out and destroyed much of it.

Pope's November prayer intention: For those who suffer from depression

"Overwork and work-related stress cause many people to experience extreme exhaustion —mental, emotional, affective, and physical exhaustion. "Pope Francis opened the video accompanying his prayer intention for November with those words with which most people can probably identify.



His intention was released in this month's The Pope Video, prepared by the Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network. It comes as people living in the Northern Hemisphere enter the Autumn and Winter seasons, during which cooler weather is often accompanied by rainy days and more time spent indoors.

Silent listening The Pope took note of that seasonal situation in his timely prayer intention. "Sadness, apathy, and spiritual tiredness end up dominating people's lives, who are overloaded due to the rhythm of life today," he said. Pope Francis thus encouraged everyone to reach out to those around us who are depressed, desperate, or without hope. And he advised against comforting others with too many words. "Often," he said, "we should just simply listen in silence, because we cannot go and tell someone, 'No, life's not like that. Listen to me, I'll give you the solution." "There is no solution," remarked the Pope.

Jesus' offer of comfort However, he continued, besides "indispensable psychological counselling", Jesus' words can help us and others to find solace: "Come to me, all who labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." With that advice in mind, Pope Francis wrapped up his prayer intention video message with a renewed invitation to assist those around us. "Let us pray that people who suffer from depression or burn-out will find support and a light that opens them up to life," he prayed.

Choosing life amid depression The November edition of The Pope Video was created in conjunction with the <u>Association of Catholic Mental Health Ministers</u>, which offers spiritual support for people suffering various forms of mental illness. According to a press release accompanying the video, around 1 in 10 people worldwide lives with a mental health disorder, amounting to 792 million people or 11 percent of the population. Depression and anxiety account for around 3 and 4 percent, respectively, of those illnesses. They can sometimes lead to suicide when left untreated or are severe and recurrent. Some 700,000 people commit suicide each year, making it the fourth leading cause of death in people aged 15 to 29.

Covid-related difficulties As has been well-noted, the Covid-19 pandemic, and its associated restrictions on daily life, has led severely tested the mental and emotional resilience of many people. Pope Francis' call for us to pray and assist those who suffer from depression is therefore an important and timely invitation.
