Saints of the Week

Memorial of Sts Cosmas and Damian Martyrs – 26th September

St Cosmas and St Damian (date uncertain; perhaps + c.300). According to tradition, whose historical reliability is unclear, they were twins who worked as doctors and were known as the Anargyri ('the silverless') on account of their practice of not charging for their services. They brought many of their patients to Christ but were finally condemned to death under Diocletian around the year

300 and suffered at Cyrrhus (Syria). Their basilica in Rome, not far from the Colosseum, was built in the sixth century BY Felix IV and their names appear in the Roman Canon.

Memorial of St Vincent de Paul, Priest - 27th September

St Vincent de Paul (1581-1660) was born in Gascony (France) and ordained a priest at the early age of twenty. Legend says he endured a period of captivity in Tunis; at any rate, after being falsely accused of theft, he dedicated himself to evangelising the poor, the unfortunate and the suffering. He founded the Congregation of Priests of the Mission (Lazarists) and, together with St Louise de Mariallac, the Daughters of Charity. These congregations, together with the well-known Society of St Vincent de Paul, continue his charitable work today.





Memorial of St Wenceslaus (Waclaw), Martyrs – 28th September

St Wenceslaus (Wenceslas, Vaclav) (907-929) was born in the castle of Stochov near Prague and became Duke of Bohemia in 921. The popular carol 'Good King Wenceslas' speaks of his strong faith and concern for the poor. However, he faced many trials in governing as a Christian prince and was finally murdered at the instigation of his brother, Boleslav, on 27th September 929. According to legend, his final words were , 'Brother, may God forgive you.'

Memorial of St Laurence Ruiz and Companions, Martyrs, Martyrs of the Philippines – 28th September

These sixteen Dominican martyrs suffered at Nishizaka Hill, near Nagasaki (Japan) in September 1637 during the persecution of the Tokugawa shogunate. Many of them were bound and hanged upside down, causing a slow death. They included St Lawrence (Lorenzo) Ruiz (c.1600-1637), a lay member of the Dominican Confraternity of the Holy Rosary and a father of three, who is the first Filipino Saint.

Feast of Sts Michael, Gabriel and Raphael, Archangels – 29th September Battle's Patronal Feast Day

The Feast celebrates the three archangels named in Sacred Scripture, reminding us of the angelic world and of their constant ministrations to the world.

St Michael (meaning 'Who is like God') is venerated as captain of the heavenly army, victor over Satan, protector of the Church and helper of the sick and dying.

Today's feast originated as that of the dedication of a Roman Basilica in his honour.

St Gabriel (meaning 'Strength of God') announced both the birth of St John the Baptist (to Zechariah) and of Jesus Christ (to the Blessed Virgin Mary). His greeting at the Annunciation, 'Hail, full of grace,' has become one of the most familiar prayers.

St Raphael (meaning 'God heals') took care of Tobias on his journey, as

described in the book of Tobit, and is often associated with the angel of the sheep pool (Jn 5:1-4). He is a patron of the blind, travellers and physicians and nurses.

Memorial of St Jerome, Priest, Doctor – 30th September

St Jerome, (Hieronymus) (c.342-420) was born in Strido (now in Croatia, then part of the Roman province of Dalmatia) and studied in Rome, where he was baptised. He retired for a while to Syria to live as a hermit and learnt Hebrew at the hands of a rabbi. Between 382 and 385 he was in Rome as secretary to Pope Damasus, who commissioned him to revise the Latin version of the Bible. He went to Bethlehem to concentrate on this work, together with the writings of Scriptural commentaries and theological works.









Memorial of St Thérèse of the Child Jesus, Virgin, Doctor – 1st October (St Theresa of Lisieux)

St Thérèse Martin (1873-1897) was born at Alençon and, aged fifteen, entered the Carmel of Lisieux, thus joining two of her sisters. Although she died of tuberculosis at the age of twenty-four, such was the influence of her spiritual writings and her 'little way' that she was declared a Doctor of the Church by Blessed John Paull II in 1997. She is also Patron of the Missions and Co-Protectress of France (with St Joan of Arc).

Pope appeals for prayers and closeness to people of Ukraine

Pope Francis said he spoke yesterday to Cardinal Konrad Krajewski who was in Ukraine on his fourth humanitarian and pastoral mission to the nation.

The Cardinal, who heads the Dicastery for the Service of Charity, gave the Pope an update and impressions on what Pope called the "terrible situation in tormented Ukraine." Cardinal Krajewski has travelled frequently to Ukraine to bring help to the people and show the Pope's closeness to



all there. Recalling his phone conversation with the Cardinal at the conclusion of Wednesday's General Audience, the Pope expressed his profound sorrow over hearing about the suffering of the people, the savagery, the horrendous acts, and tortured bodies they are discovering again there. He asked everyone to draw close to this "noble and martyred" people who have suffered terribly.

The modern-day miracle of the fishes and devotion in Ozernoe, Kazakhstan

Until Pope Francis visited Kazakhstan last week and brought attention to the faith and culture of the local Catholic population, many may not have been aware of nor associated Kazakhstan, south of Russia, as a site of a modern-day miracle of the fishes. As a result, Ozernoe has earned international attention, despite the fact that throughout the 20th century, it had already been a beloved site of Kazakh Catholic devotion.





During his Apostolic Visit, Pope Francis remembered the miraculous site throughout his discourses with affection.

Moreover, the beautiful icon of the Madonna, named 'The Mother of the Great Steppe,' which was blessed in the Cathedral in Nur-Sultan, will find its home at the beloved national shrine of Ozernoe. Vatican News spoke to local Church official, Msgr. Piotr Pytlowany, about Ozernoe's history, and its meaning to Kazakh Catholics and

all the faithful of Central Asia. God's answer - enough fish to feed other parts of Kazakhstan "After the Second World War, people of northern Kazakhstan experienced hunger. And what they could do, was just to pray to the Almighty," he told us. Prior to the miracle, Fr. Piotr explained, people were praying the rosary. He recalled that at the time, under the Communist regime, there were no priests and no Masses were celebrated.

Monsignor Piotr Pytlowany: "During spring, when the snow started to come down, a small lake appeared. And to the surprise of many, in this lake, there were so many fish. There were enough for the people of this region, and even for people from other parts of Kazakhstan. The majority of people understood it as an answer of God for our prayers."

This miracle took place on 25 March 1941, as the people were starving during the Second World War, as nourishment was going toward battle lines. "After many years, this fact was especially inspected by our Metropolitan Archbishop [of Astana] Tomasz Peta, and together with other people, they constructed a small church," he said. At this moment, he said, this church is our national shrine, where "for many years, people have received another food, not fish, but spiritual food."

"People are fed there by spiritual food. And what I find especially beautiful in Ozernoe is that the devotion of people who pilgrimage to Ozernoe is directed not toward a statue or image, but for them is very important to experience the spiritual presence of Our Lady."

The beginning of Christianity in these territories, he explained, began in the 5th century, noting its development, continued over the centuries. The growth of Catholic Church in particular, Monsignor Piotr pointed out, was connected to the Franciscan friars who came to the Central Asian country in the 13th century.

Ready for more pilgrims from afar: There are pilgrims who are not only Catholic inhabitants of Kazakhstan, not only Kazakhstanis, but also from abroad and afar. For instance, many travel from bordering Russia, Uzbekistan, Kyrgyzstan. However, others make the journey from Poland, Belarus, Georgia, Ukraine, and even some from the United States, and Italy. As the shrine is located amid Kazakhstan's vast steppes and open fields, some joke the beloved pilgrimage site has the largest square before it, ready to accommodate growing devotion of pilgrims. The history: On 19 March 1990, faithful obtained permission to build the church, and in May, they began construction. Fr. Tomasz Peta (now Archbishop of Maria Santissima in Astana) arrived and became its first parish priest. Before Christmas of the following year, the Statue of Our Lady arrived in Ozernoe. Cardinal Josef Glemp blessed the church on 9 Aug. 1992, and Bishop Jan Pavel Lenga would later consecrate it. In Autumn of 1994, the priests of Kazakhstan and Central Asia decided to choose Our Lady of Ozernoe as a patroness of the Catholic Church in Central Asia. On the anniversary of the miracle, on 25 March 1996, perpetual adoration continued from the morning to the evening, and on 25 June, Bishop Lenga consecrated the nation to Our Lady in front of the statue of Our Lady of Ozernoe. During Pope St. John Paul II's 2001 visit to Kazakhstan, he consecrated Kazakhstan to Our Lady in front of this same statue which had been brought to the nation's capital for the occasion.

Continuing the miracle: Some observed the miracle, in a way, continuing even as recent as 2017. In the spring of that year, the miraculous lake started to grow again, and in the winter, numerous fish appeared there once again. Some Kazakhstani Catholics also attribute this event to the 100th-anniversary of Our Lady of Fatima.
