Saints of the Week


Feast of The Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary - 31st May

The Visitation commemorates the meeting between Mary and her cousin St Elizabeth at Ein Kerem, just outside Jerusalem. Feeling the presence of his Divine Saviour, St John the Baptist leapt in his mother's womb on the Blessed Virgin's arrival. Following St Elizabeth's words of greeting, Our Lady proclaimed the Magnificat, a hymn praising the Lord for all that He had done for His handmaid and expressing her attitude of faith and humility.



Memorial of St Justin, Martyr - 1st June

Born at the beginning of the second century, at Nablus in Samaria. His family was pagan. He was a philosopher, and became a Christian at about the age of 30. He went first to Ephesus, and then to Rome, where he established a school. He wrote many works in defence of Christianity, of which the two Apologies, and his Dialogue with Trypho survive. He gives us the earliest description of the rite of baptism, and of a Sunday Mass. He was martyred, with six others, five men and a woman, during the time of Marcus Aurelius, about 165.



Memorial of Ss Marcellinus and Peter, Martyrs - 2nd June

Ss Marcellinus and Peter (+c.304) were members of the Church of Rome; St Marcellinus was a zealous priest and St Peter an exorcist (one of the minor orders). They were beheaded under Diocletian. One tradition says their executioner subsequently became a Christian and related the story of their martyrdom to Pope St Damasus. Their names are included in the Roman Canon.



Memorial of St Charles Lwanga and Companions, Martyrs - 3rd June

The twenty-two martyrs of Uganda were put to death by the king, Mwanga, whose objection to their Christianity was reinforced by their resistance to impure demands of them. Some were quite young boys; some were still catechumens, though Charles Lwanga baptised these before their death. Even the youngest of all, Kizito, persevered to the end despite the entreaties of his family.

MASS FOR THE SOLEMNITY OF PENTECOST (Day of Prayer for the Church)

Weekend 4th / 5th June 2022

Pentecost (Whitsunday), with Christmas and Easter, ranks among the great feasts of Christianity. It commemorates not only the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and Disciples, but also the fruits and effects of that event: the completion of the work of redemption, the fullness of grace for the Church and its children, and the gift of faith for all nations.

<u>Introduction to the Scripture Readings:</u>

- First Reading: Acts 2:1-11
 - An unusual noise brought people rushing to where the apostles were. They found them filled with the Holy Spirit and speaking in diverse languages.
- Second Reading: Romans 8:8-17

 The indwelling of the Holy Spirit transforms human beings so that they become spiritual people.
- Gospel: John 14:15-16. 23-26

 The Spirit of God comes to dwell with all who live by Christ's teachings, guiding them in how to live.

Cycle of prayer: during Ordinary Time (Summer), i.e. up to September, we are asked to pray for these intentions: a deeper understanding between Christians and Jews; those who suffer persecution, oppression and denial of human rights; Europe; human life; seafarers.

Events of the Week

Pentecost Sunday: The Holy Spirit is first and foremost a Creator Spirit, hence Pentecost is also a feast of creation. For us Christians, the world is the fruit of an act of love by God who has made all things and in which he rejoices because it is "good", it is "very good", as the creation narrative tells us (cf. Gn 1:1-31). Consequently God is not totally Other, unnameable and obscure. God reveals himself, he has a face. God is reason, God is will,



God is love, God is beauty. Faith in the Creator Spirit and faith in the Spirit whom the Risen Christ gave to the Apostles and gives to each one of us are therefore inseparably united. The Gospel passage offers us a marvellous image to clarify the connection between Jesus, the Holy Spirit and the Father: the Holy Spirit is portrayed as the breath of the Risen Jesus Christ. Here the Evangelist Hohn takes up an image of the creation narrative, where it says that God breathed into the nostrils of man the breath of life (cf. Gn 2:7). The breath of God is life. Now, the Lord breathes into our soul the new life, the Holy Spirit, his most intimate essence, and in this way welcomes us into God's family. With Baptism and Confirmation this gift was given to us specifically, and with the sacraments of the Eucharist and Penance it is continuously repeated: the Lord breathes a breath of life into our soul.

Memorial of Mary, Mother of the Church - 6th June


One Mother, two motherhoods

Mary mothered Jesus, Jesus then gave life to the Church with water and blood from His side, and the Church then mothers us into existence through baptism. Devotion to Mary goes hand in hand with devotion to the Church because both are mothers. Mother Mary gives the world Christ. Mother Church gives the world Christians.



Feast Our Lord Jesus Christ, Eternal High Priest - 9th June (according to the order of Melchizedek)

In him the Father has been well pleased from before all time. As Mediator between God and human beings, fulfilling his Father's will, he sacrificed himself once on the altar of the Cross as a saving Victim for the whole world. Thus, instituting the pattern of an everlasting sacrifice, with a brother's kindness he chose, from among the children of Adam, men to augment the priesthood, so that, from the sacrifice continually renewed in the Church, streams of divine power might flow, whereby a



new heaven and a new earth might be made, and throughout the whole universe there would be perfected what no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor has entered into the human heart.

Vatican News

Nicaraguan Bishop goes on indefinite hunger strike

Rolando Alvarez is the Bishop of Matagalpa, which has a population of 109,000 people and is the seventh largest city in Nicaragua, located in the centre of the country. He says the Nicaraguan Police have been following and shadowing him non-stop. This even continued when he was visiting his niece. Bishop Alvarez, who's a stern critic of President Daniel



Ortega's Sandanista Government, which has arrested dozens of opposition politicians, is demanding the release of all political prisoners. He's now saying that he will continue his hunger strike until the police, who've told him they're only obeying orders, promise to respect the privacy of his family and back off. Other Priests are reporting similar types of harassment. Nicaragua's Congress, which is dominated by the Sandanista Party, has already threatened to imprison Catholic priests who question or defy their authority. Cardinal Leopoldo Brenes, the Archbishop of the capital, Managua, insists that the Church isn't the enemy of the government and will pray for them.

Gallagher: I met a wounded and brave people, dialogue is needed for peace

"The Ukrainian people are truly a wounded people and at the same time very courageous, very determined: we cannot overlook the great suffering of this great people... We must renew our commitment to resolve the conflict through diplomatic and political dialogue." Archbishop Paul Richard Gallagher, concluding his mission to Ukraine, takes stock of the trip with Vatican News.



Speaking in Italian, Archbishop Gallagher describes the importance of the ecumenical spirit in rebuilding the peace of future Ukraine. He explains that at a time like this, in any country, "there is also the danger of rivalries beginning to grow, and resentment towards one another." He says that for this reason it is indispensable that everyone remain firmly determined to work "for the unity of the country, of the political body of the country, for the unity of Christians, the unity of the Catholic Church, the unity with other religions, to be able to take advantage of the spiritual resources, of the grace that God grants in these moments, and not dissipate these things in difficulties, in quarrels."

Archbishop Gallagher then speaks of the courage of an Orthodox priest he met in Bucha, "who recounts those terrible days, when there were corpses everywhere and he asked that they be buried."

We can see that in the end, perhaps, in some places things are a little better these days, "but the wounds remain and even we in our small way, we come, we try to talk to them, to show empathy towards their suffering, a gesture of support, a gesture of encouragement." However, Archbishop Gallagher stresses that this "in my opinion is not something we humans can do alone. Truly when we are in need, we absolutely feel the need for the encounter with Christ who heals our wounds. In a certain sense, Ukraine must walk a little like Mary Magdalene in the

garden to encounter the risen Christ. Only this can dry the tears of this people. I am convinced that when you see these people there is great human solidarity, but there is also great faith. I am convinced that the people, through deepening their faith, regardless of their traditions - Catholic, Orthodox, Protestant, Jewish and other religions - can come to the resurrection, even at this Easter time."

Comment of Archbishop Paul Richard Gallagher at the conclusion of mission to Ukraine Archbishop Paul Richard Gallagher: As this mission draws to a conclusion today, I'd like to really express my thanks, above all, to God who's been with us I think in every step. And also to everybody who's facilitated it. Civil authorities, both in Poland and in the Ukraine, the Church authorities who've been so hospitable and who've enabled us to meet with them and to talk very frankly. We've been received with great pleasure. I would say we kept our promise. I promised Minister Kuleba I would come. We came and we've talked, and we will continue to talk. Ukraine at this moment has many needs.

For much of these needs, the churches have helped enormously. I've heard great praise for Caritas, great praise for what the diocese and the parishes and the bishops have done, both Greek Catholics and Latin Catholics here. So that's something to be very, very proud of. And there's also been great recognition of the great work done by Poland and their extraordinary generosity, both in receiving refugees and in sending humanitarian aid to the Ukraine. But we need to move forward, that sustaining of Ukraine needs to continue. We need to help them. We need to encourage them. We need to help them to always remain optimistic and faithful. We need to make every effort that in the conduct of this conflict, that the values of this people that are profoundly Christian should prevail over anything which might be more negative or more conflictual.

There's going to be a lot of work to be done for probably many years in rebuilding the society. And this is a society which is going to have to really foster its unity at every level, the Church level, the political level, in terms of governance and in terms of renewing its industry. The world has great need for the Ukraine. We need that they can share their grain and their sunflower oil with us and all these things. And we need to work together so that also all the fallout from this terrible conflict in terms of the various crises which we're facing as the economic crisis, the food crisis, the supply chain crisis, all of these things which we read about and hear about constantly, so that in our work with Ukraine, we can we can also embrace the greater good of humanity, which is really threatened at this time.
