Jean Mary Douglas, RIP, 1927 – 2018




Thanks to Kathryn Clary, Jean's daughter, for allowing us to print this brief tribute, based on that in the Order of Service for Jean's Requiem Mass at St Teresa's 10 December 2018:

From an early age, Jean, who was an only child, took over her parents' flower garden, learnt to recognise the calls of song birds and developed a deep love for literature, classical music and poetry. To become an artist was her ambition. Jean had her studio and she would snatch time there whenever possible. Pastels became her favourite medium and she was thrilled when she was accepted to exhibit at the annual exhibition of the Pastel Society in London. Landscapes were her main inspiration but latterly she concentrated on flowers, becoming an established member of the Society of Botanical Artists. She had hoped to read English Literature at Cambridge, but when this plan was thwarted by the war she opted for teaching, her career spanning 40 years. She specialised in English and, of course, Art. She was also a keen historian, frequently researching and writing articles. Early medieval churches particularly moved her. Jean was a woman with strong convictions and a powerful personality combined with great warmth. She appreciated everything in nature including landscape, trees, birds. She was an amazing cook and knew how to bring everyone together. She believed that life was to be lived and made the most of. Her love was generous and selfless and she was and remains the lifeblood of her family. She always made time for her children and grandchildren, supporting them through every trial and rejoicing in their triumphs. She also had long-standing friends from her teaching days and latterly she enjoyed the lively discussions of the local book club and other friends. The last years supporting Frank, who died only a few months before Jean, drew on all her strength and determination, as did the recent months on her own. She painted and wrote poetry right to the end. She was greatly loved and is sorely missed by her extensive family, who often appeared with her and Frank at Mass at St Teresa's.
