## Saints of the Week

# Memorial of The Passion of St John the Baptist – 29<sup>th</sup> August

The Gospels relate how St John fearlessly condemned Herod Antipas's unlawful marriage to Herodias, who had been previously married to his half-brother. The outraged Herodius had him imprisoned. In a moment of weakness Herod promised to grant the heart's desire of Salome, the



daughter of Herodias. She asked for St John's head, which was promptly fetched for her. Thus the Precursor of the Lord preceded his Master through his passion.


Memorial of St Margaret Clitherow, Anne Line and Margaret Ward, Martyrs - 30th August

This day commemorates the three canonised female martrys of the English Reformation: St Margaret Clitherow (1556-1586), a native of York and convert to Catholism, who sheltered priests and was pressed to death in her home town on 25<sup>th</sup> March 1586; St Anne Line (1567- 1601) from Dunmow, Essex who also harboured priests and was hanged at Tyburn on 27<sup>th</sup> February 1601; St Margaret Ward (+1588), born in Congleton, Cheshire, who worked in London and attempted to help a priest escape from prison. She was hanged at Tyburn on 30<sup>th</sup> August 1588. All three were canonised in 1970 amongst the Forty Martyrs of England and Wales.



# Memorial of St Aidan, Bishop, Missionary, and Saints of Lindisfarne - 31st August

St Aidan or Aedan (+651) was an Irish monk who joined the community at Iona and was sent to preach the Gospel in Northumbria. He was consecrated bishop and settled on the island of Lindisfarne, with the support of King St Oswald and his successor St Oswin. After St Aidan's death in 651, the 'Holy Island' of Lindisfarne continued to produce many saints instrumental in the evangelisation of northern England, until the monastery was devasted by Vikings. These saints include the bishops St Fina, St Colman, St Eata, St Eadfrith, and, of course, St Cuthbert (4<sup>th</sup> September).



# Feast of St Gregory the Great, Pope, Doctor - 3<sup>rd</sup> September

St Gregory the Great (540-604) belonged to a Roman patrician family and served as a magistrate before embracing the monastic life. He acted as papal legate at Constantinople and was elected Pope in 590. He tightened church discipline and liturgical practice, reorganised the lands belonging to the Holy See and sent St Augustine to convert the Kingdom of Kent. He is consequently called the 'Apostle of the English' and, thanks to his theological and pastoral writings, is a Doctor of the Church.

Pope expresses sorrow for Nicaragua, says dialogue should be basis for a respectful coexistence

With words full of pain, Pope Francis spoke out at Sunday's Angelus about the events of recent weeks in Nicaragua, where the Church, its priests and bishops, the media, and NGOs have been caught up in a series of harassing and persecutory actions because they are suspected of supporting the opponents of Daniel Ortega's Sandinista government: "I am following closely, with concern and



sorrow, the situation in Nicaragua, which involves both people and institutions," the Pope declared, adding, "I would like to express my conviction and my hope that, through open and sincere dialogue, the basis for a respectful and peaceful coexistence can still be found." The Pope then invoked the intercession of Mary Immaculate, the "Purísima" so dear to the people of Nicaragua: "Let us ask the Lord, through the intercession of the Most Pure, to inspire such a concrete will in the hearts of all."

The suffering of the Church of Nicaragua: Dialogue, a call to respect, and prayer: This is the appeal of Pope Francis, as he joins his voice to that of international institutions and the Churches of America and Europe concerned about what is happening, following the closure of a series of Catholic broadcasting stations, the halting of the work of NGOs, the expulsion from the country of the Congregation of the Sisters of Mother Teresa, and the suspension of ecclesiastical activities, the arrest of priests, and most recently - last Friday night - the forced removal, turned into house arrest, of the bishop of the diocese of Matagalpa, Bishop Rolando Álvarez. The Bishop, together with several priests and lay people, had been confined under surveillance in the diocesan curia since the beginning of August. Police claim the Bishop had tried to organize violent groups and incited acts of hatred to destabilise the government. Bishop Álvarez had also initially tried to pray in the street, carrying the Eucharist in a monstrance, but was stopped by police officers. "We want to do God's will, we are in his hands," wrote the 55year-old prelate in a tweet while he was still in Matagalpa. Today his health has deteriorated, although his morale remains strong. In Managua, he was able to see his family and meet the vicepresident of the bishops' conference, Cardinal Leopoldo Brenes, who had a long talk with him. The appeals of the international community: The conditions of the bishop of Matagalpa, the imprisonment of the priests and lay people who were with him, and the social tension in the country, have also drawn the concern of the international community. The United Nations has raised concerns of a serious "obstruction of democratic and civil life" in Nicaragua, while the

Organisation of American States (OAS) and the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights (IACHR) have warned of "persecution" and "criminalisation." They all call on the Ortega government to protect universal human rights and to return freedom to those arbitrarily detained. In numerous messages that are arriving from the bishops' conferences throughout the world, there is also the invitation - reiterated today by Francis - to pray and to be actively close to the Central American country, and to recognize the underlying witness of faith and community that it is offering at a time of trial. Most recently, the Cuban bishops, along with the Panamanian and Venezuelan bishops' conferences have raised their voices in the same sense. Bishop Álvarez has himself expressed confidence in the prayers of all in the face of this difficult situation. "Aware that prayer is the Christian's strength," he said, according to local media reports, "the invitation is to continue to implore Christ to intercede and watch over this small flock of His."

#### Pope Francis to attend first-ever 'Vitae' Summit in the Vatican

The Vatican announced on Friday that the Vitae Global Foundation will hold its first summit meeting at the Casina Pio IV on 31 August and 1 September. Pope Francis is expected to take part in a portion of the summit, which also enjoys the support of Queen Sofia of Spain. A press statement said internationally-renowned artists and entertainers will gather to discuss how to "leverage the arts, media, and entertainment to trigger a cultural



transformation that promotes the common good, universal values, and an encounter between people."

Inspiring hope, unity, diversity: Artists, actors, actresses, and musicians will hold meetings to share their thoughts on strategies and creative proposals to advance the goal of inspiring a change in the world. Unity, hope, and the appreciation of diversity are among the main goals of the change which the summit aims to inspire. The founder and president of the Vitae Foudation, Luis Quinelli, has held several meetings with Pope Francis in recent years, along with members of the organisation's leadership team. The Pope has often spoken about the role of artist in improving society, saying they act as "guardians of beauty, ambassadors of a culture of encounter, and witnesses of hope for all humanity."

Creating a better world: Mr. Quinelli said the summit hopes to highlight the work of various organisations and individuals toward improving culture. "In a polarised society charged with negative messages and conflicts," he said, "the Vitae Foundation has set out to unite artists and influential global leaders to start a conversation on how to bring hope and the common good back into fashion through the arts, in order to positively impact people's hearts and spirits." The Argentine-born founder of Vitae added that the event will also help create a network among artists geared toward working together to craft a message that will "inspire us toward a better world, based on the universal values that foster encounter and hope."

About the Vitae Foundation: The Vitae Global Foundation is a non-profit organisation made up of artists, executives, and world leaders who aim to make a positive impact on people through the arts, mass media, and entertainment. According to the foundation, Vitae has promoted various cultural projects and initiatives in recent years which have "positively impacted hundreds of thousands of people around the world, generating multiple points of rapprochement, and embracing differences to combat the polarisation and hatred that threatens today's society."
