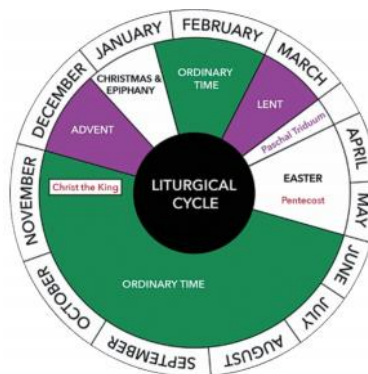

New Parish Update

Update on the formation of Our New Parish Family

As we continue our journey towards becoming a single parish community across the deanery, we want to share an update on how this new structure is taking shape. On behalf of the clergy team, thank you for your openness, prayers, and commitment during this time of change and opportunity. We're especially grateful for your patience, as we have so far been working quietly behind the scenes — but are now ready to engage more directly with all of you in our church communities.

A New Parish Pastoral Plan (PPP)

A key part of growing together as one parish is developing a **Parish Pastoral Plan (PPP)** — a simple and evolving roadmap to guide us forward. Rooted in the Diocesan Pastoral Plan and building on action points already discussed in our Parish Leadership Group (PLG) meetings, the PPP will focus on three core values:

Prayer – Formation – Mission

This plan will not be imposed from above but will grow organically from our shared hopes and experiences. Through regular meetings of the **Moderated Priest Team (MPT)** and **Hub Teams (HTS)**, we'll encourage wide participation and shared reflection — a truly synodal process.

The PPP will provide clarity and consistency where needed (e.g., parish-wide policies or sacramental programmes) while also giving space for each community to express its unique gifts.

How Will Decisions Be Made?

Moderated Priest Team (MPT)

The MPT, made up of priests serving across the parish, holds legal and canonical responsibility for care of the parish — similar to a single parish priest in the current model. The team works collaboratively, drawing on each priest's individual gifts, especially in the ministry of the sacraments, preaching, formation, and pastoral care. The MPT will sign off on major parish-wide decisions, guided by input from

the Hub Teams. The Moderator, as team leader, ensures decisions are made when needed and coordinates with the Diocese. Administrative tasks (buildings, finance, safeguarding, etc.) will be appropriately shared, in close connection with the Parish Finance Committee and local support teams.

Hub Teams (HTS)

Each Hub Team brings together clergy and lay representatives from across our churches. These teams will shape and implement the PPP through:

- **Prayer and Discernment** – grounding each meeting in Scripture and the Holy Spirit.
- **Sharing and Reflection** – exchanging ideas and insights rooted in our mission.
- **Practical Action** – helping implement agreed plans suited to the local context, ensuring consistency across the parish.

Between meetings, small groups within the HTS will carry out specific tasks — for example, supporting catechists, liturgists, or school staff.

The Role of the Moderator

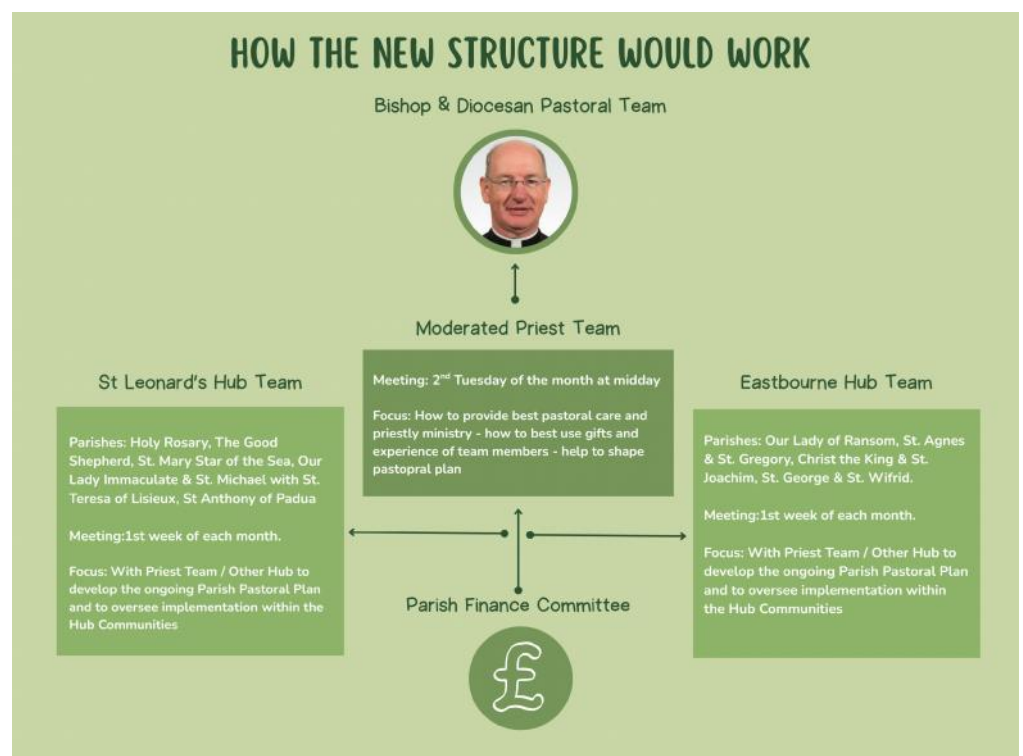
The Moderator will attend all MPT and HTS meetings, ensure good communication, and oversee the development of the PPP. He will liaise with the Diocese, support parish offices, and help ensure we have the communication and administrative resources we need.

Next Steps

In the coming months, we'll invite broader participation and deeper reflection as we shape our new parish identity together. Please continue to pray for the guidance of the Holy Spirit — and for one another — as we step into this new chapter with hope and faith.

New Parish Update

The Pastoral Plan:

As a deanery we are not unique in becoming a single parish, it is all part of our Diocese Pastoral Plan. Here's more detail on the plan.

Bishop Richard issued his [third Pastoral Plan for the Diocese](#), in January 2024, appointing Canon Kieron O'Brien as the Episcopal Vicar for Pastoral Planning. In a reflection shared with Catholic churches in Epsom recently, Canon Kieron explored the progress of the Plan: "Over the past 17 months, across the Diocese, our eleven former deaneries have started the process of becoming eleven new parishes, served by a team of clergy, who — while retaining their particular connection to a specific community — will be working more closely with each other than before.

"Each of these new parishes is at a different stage, with the pace of change tailored to local circumstances, but it is hoped that by the end of this year (2025) all eleven new parishes will be formally established. This new model will hopefully facilitate some economies of scale and sharing of resources.

However, if we see this purely as a structural change to enable greater efficiency, we will be missing the whole point of the Pastoral Plan. To this end, we need to return to three key words: **Vision, Mission and Synodality**.

"It is essential that the leadership (clergy and laity) in our new parishes can unite around a shared vision of what the Catholic Church, in this time and place, can look like, and feel like. Bishop Richard shares his vision for the Diocese in the opening pages of the Pastoral Plan; that is a good place to start, but the vision also needs to set the direction of travel locally, so that the Parish can be truly mission focused... This can only be achieved in a spirit of *synodality*, which is 'church speak' for 'walking together and accompanying each other in faith.' Key to this are *conversations in the Spirit* (which can be one-to-one or in small groups) whereby we listen deeply to each other, to discover what is in our hearts *for our new parishes*."

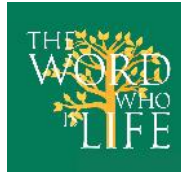

Deanery Parishes Marked the Feast of Corpus Christi with Pilgrimage, Procession and Prayer

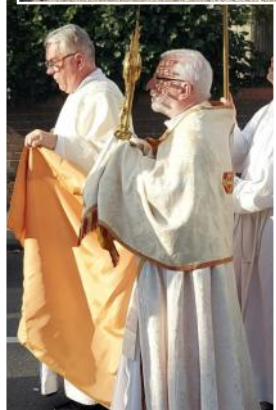

On Thursday 19 June 2025, pilgrims from the Parish of St George and St Wilfrid and the Parish of Christ the King and St Joachim joined a pilgrimage to the Carpet of Flowers at Arundel Cathedral. Forty-three pilgrims from across the Eastbourne Hub, accompanied by Fr Rory and Fr Charles, attended Mass, the Eucharistic procession, and Benediction amid the stunning floral display. On Saturday 21st June, a joyful Eucharistic Procession took place from St Joachim Church to Christ the King in Eastbourne, bringing the Blessed Sacrament through the streets and uniting the parish's two churches. Light Has Found Him

The death of Pope Francis on Easter Monday has stirred a global wave of affection, reflection, and mourning. That he died the day after the Church proclaims the triumph of life over death has not gone unnoticed. It felt like divine timing—that the Pope who sought always to bring the Church closer to the people be called home during the celebration of Easter. Since the death of Pope Francis, countless reflections and tributes have been shared across the globe. Here, we share the experience and reflections of two priests from our own deanery: **Fr Charles**, Assistant Parish Priest of the Eastbourne Churches—Our Lady of Ransom, St Agnes, and St Gregory—and **Fr Eamonn**, SAC, Parish Priest of St Mary Star of the Sea, Hastings.



blessings on the waiting crowd but also got on the Popemobile and was driven around the square to greet pilgrims."

Fr Charles writes that he was struck with "profound amazement" by the Pope's determination to carry out his duty, even in such evident frailty. That very next morning, after landing in Rome for what was to be a joyful visit, he received the news that Pope Francis had died:

"The message was received with mixed feelings. I had just seen the Pope yesterday, and today he is gone! His death was sudden, but not surprising. May God rest his soul."

In a particularly powerful detail, Fr Charles recounts how he queued "like all other mourners—no special treatment" to pay his respects as Pope Francis lay in state in St Peter's Basilica. He describes this as "a rare moment... a great privilege to pray before the corpse of 'the people's Pope'—a man who was all things to all people."

Meanwhile, Fr Eamonn, writing from a quieter setting in Mervue, shared a deeply personal reflection on his blog. His piece, filled with memory, reverence, and spiritual insight, opens with the words of Jesus:

"Do not judge and you will not be judged."

Fr Eamonn reflects:

"Mostly I have thought of this in terms of not judging others negatively. But it also means not judging others at all. Who am I to judge someone to be good or bad, right or wrong?... Even in the positive comments, you get the sense that experts are judging him to have done a fairly good job. But who are we to say even that?"

Instead, Fr Eamonn invites us to remember Pope Francis not as a figure to be graded, but as someone who deeply touched the lives of many. He shares a memory of the day of Francis's election in 2013—rushing

home to share the joy with his parish priest, who had known the Cardinal from Buenos Aires. That priest later met Pope Francis and received a zucchetto from him, which Fr Eamonn briefly wore:

"Feeling it like a blessing on top of me... It was the closest physical contact I ever had with Pope Francis."

His one and only time seeing Pope Francis live was at Pope Benedict XVI's funeral. He describes how the Pope's voice—frail, soft, gentle—left a lasting impression:

"It is the sound of God's voice that I sensed, heard in Pope Francis... Even though I understood some of what he said, it was the presence of God that I felt in the sound of his servant's voice."

And in a moment that felt charged with grace:

"The sunlight broke through the fog and rested on him as he gave his homily. It was like a transfiguration."

Perhaps Pope Francis inspired most by who he was: not just what he said or did, but how he made others feel seen, known, and loved. His attention to the overlooked—the woman with yellow flowers at Gemelli Hospital, the daily phone call to a priest in Gaza, his childlike wave through a screen—touched something deep in the human heart.

As one anonymous tribute beautifully put it:

"Light has found him. And Love has brought him home."

Let us now pray that Pope Francis, the humble servant who bowed before the world before blessing it, may receive the fullness of God's blessing and rest in His eternal peace.

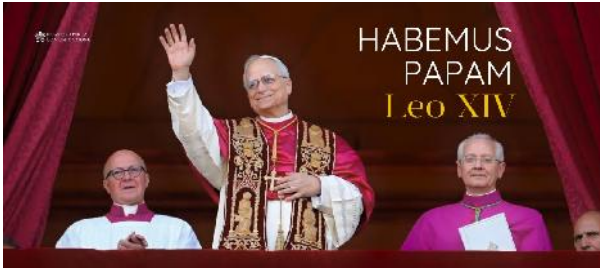


Fr Charles, wrote movingly of his own feelings surrounding his encounter of the Pope just the day before his death:

"My first Easter celebration in the United Kingdom was a beautiful event... the climax of the Easter Sunday morning celebration was to watch, at that time, our ailing Holy Father, Pope Francis, come out on the balcony of St Peter's Square to give the Easter Blessing... Despite the Pope's failing health, he not only imparted his

Welcoming Pope Leo XIV



Welcoming Pope Leo XIV

Since the announcement of the election of Pope Leo XIV, there has been a wave of joy and curiosity across the Catholic world. As we begin this new chapter in the life of the Church, we are especially blessed in our deanery and diocese to count among us priests who have known, worked with, or encountered the new Pope personally. Their reflections give us a deeply human and spiritual perspective on the man who now carries the mantle of Peter.

Here we share the thoughts of three priests from our own deanery who served in the Diocese of Chulucanas, Peru as part of the Arundel and Brighton diocesan mission group: **Fr Kevin**; **Fr Hugh Dutton**, now retired and living in Eastbourne; and **Fr Ian Byrnes**, formerly parish priest of St Leonards and now retired in Horsham.

Habemus Papam – A Local Meaning

Fr Ian Byrnes recalls the words *Habemus Papam* taking on a new resonance when the man stepping out onto the balcony in St Peter's Square was someone he had known and worked alongside.

Fr Ian first met Fr Robert Prevost, now Pope Leo XIV, in Peru he remembers:

"I found, being deaf in my left ear, his body language was very welcoming, and I felt very much at ease with him. He was a great listener with a smooth sense of humour, and yet I felt there was a 'four-wheel drive under the bonnet,' so to speak... It was great to listen to him with such advice to give me for my good and others. He was very clear in his thinking and living."

Later, Fr Ian shared a moving prayer from Rome earlier this year:

"When I was in St Peter's Square, I said to Jesus as I took a photo of the window

where we would see the new pope, "When you open the window, please let "Bob" come out and lead us on your behalf.' Glad to say that I was not shocked, like others, but deeply moved with the Lord's peace and joy."

The Gentle Strength of a Leader

Fr Hugh Dutton also worked closely with Pope Leo in Peru during his time as Chancellor of the Diocese of Chulucanas. He fondly remembers him from those early years up until Fr Prevost's call to Rome in 2001:

"My main memory of him was in the staff meetings where he was very supportive of me when things could sometimes get a bit tense. He was great to work with: kind, understanding and very patient and it was great to have him as my 'boss'."

Fr Hugh further remembers the seminarians being sent to Trujillo, where Pope Leo was then Dean of Studies:

"He had an understanding of the Church not only as institution but as living community, and that came through in the way he led and supported others."

Fr Kevin served in Peru between 2005 and 2008 and met the future Pope Leo on a few occasions in the Diocese of Chulucanas, when he was visiting, and also met him in Rome in his role as Prior General of the Augustinians:

"Though I cannot claim to have a personal close relationship with the Pope, I grew to 'know him' by his wonderful reputation in Peru as a gifted and truly pastoral priest and then Bishop. I am really excited with his appointment and

all that he will bring as universal shepherd of the Church!"

As we begin this papacy, it is striking to note how many people have encountered Pope Leo as a man of calm, humility, and strength—firm in his faith and grounded in service, especially to the poor. As Fr Ian notes:

"He has grown beautifully into this ministry of showing the Father's Faith, Hope, and Love to each of us and all of us together in the world. He continues to be a servant of God and His children."

Let us keep Pope Leo XIV in our prayers. May he lead the Church in peace and wisdom, and may we, as Pope Francis once urged, become ever more missionary disciples, witnesses of the joy of the Gospel in our own communities.

CWL Reborn

Since its founding in 1906, the Catholic Women's League (CWL) has been a vibrant part of Catholic life across England and Wales—and a strong presence in our Arundel & Brighton Diocese. While some sections have closed in recent years due to age-related challenges, fresh energy is breathing new life into the League. The CWL continues to be a space where Catholic women gather to live out their faith, support one another, and serve the Church and wider community.

One exciting sign of this renewal is the launch of a new CWL Section in Eastbourne. On Sunday 25 May, the new Section gathered for its inaugural Mass, where Section Officers were formally inducted by Fr Neil, a key supporter of this new beginning. **Brenda Hilliam, Diocesan Branch President**, was present to warmly welcome the team and the first group of members forming the core of this local initiative.

Their first major event—a fundraising quiz night on Friday 27 June—was a great success. Over £500 was raised to support the Deanery's youth pilgrimage to Flame. The evening was led by 18-year-old quizmasters Maria and Lilia, who delivered a fun and varied quiz, complete with tricky questions and a lively sing-along in the "finish the lyric" round.

Congratulations to the winning team, *Martin's Manic Mechanics*—which included none other than Parish Priest **Fr Neil**, proving our clergy have a wealth of knowledge under their hats! This initiative quickly gained traction in Salford and then Manchester. It kept growing. Soon there were Catenian groups in Hastings, Eastbourne and throughout East and West Sussex. Thousands of Catholic men across Great Britain formed similar local groups and involved their wives and families. Each man soon realised the value of Catenian membership. A century later, the Catenian Association has spread to other parts of the globe and, whilst adapting to our modern world it continues to foster friendship and support among its members. Getting together

Local Catenians from some ten miles or so around Hastings & Bexhill meet monthly and another group meets in Eastbourne. Meetings are for Catenians but are then followed by an informal, very social gathering or dinner which many wives and visitors also attend. Wives and the widows of Catenians are always welcome at our social gatherings and dinners, as are our families.

Friendship in Faith

The Catenians are not political and in no way a pressure group. We are a group of Catholic social friends. The twin purposes of Catenians are simply friendship and to lend support to each other in the practise of our faith. Fund raising is not our primary purpose but we do support charities and last year alone we social Catenians raised and donated over £250,000 for good causes.

Over the coming issues of the Deanery Newsletter, we'll be introducing the nine priests who faithfully serve our communities. It's a chance to get to know them a little better:

We begin with Fr Kevin.



Hello, I'm Father Kevin Dring. I currently serve as the Moderator-to-be for the new Single Parish of Eastbourne & St Leonards, as well as the Parish Priest of Our Lady of Ransom, St Gregory, and St Agnes in Eastbourne.

I grew up in a loving Catholic family in Brighton, where faith was an important part of life. From an early age, I felt drawn to serving God, though it took time and reflection before I fully understood that priesthood was my calling. I had quite a dramatic "Damascus Road" experience at the end of my law degree studies, and with the encouragement of my family and mentors, I began my formal preparation at the English College in Rome. Six very happy years! I was ordained in 1993, and since then, my journey of ministry has been rich and varied, including parishes, Bishop's Secretary, a few years of national vocations work in London working for the Bishops' Conference, and time spent teaching and helping train future priests in the Seminary.

One of the most formative chapters of my priesthood was the time I spent in Peru, serving in a rural parish high in the Andes. Life there was simple and often challenging, but the faith of the people was remarkable. I remember travelling on foot or by mule to celebrate Mass in tiny mountain chapels, surrounded by communities that had very little materially but shared so much spiritually. During my

time in Peru, I was privileged to encounter the now Pope Leo XIV (see reflection on page 7).

In my current role, I have the privilege of walking alongside our eight Deanery parish communities as we come together to form a single parish family. It's a role that requires patience, listening, and collaboration. My "day job" is care of some of the churches in Eastbourne, with my excellent new colleague from Nigeria, Fr Charles. Each parish day is different — celebrating Mass, visiting those who are sick or lonely, supporting our schools and volunteers, and working with lay leaders to help try to build a vibrant and welcoming parish. What I love most is meeting people, sharing their stories, and witnessing how faith can bring hope and joy.

My family live in the Brighton area which is great for access, and I have a lovely two-year-old dog, Lilly, who ensures lots of walks in our beautiful local surroundings.

Two saints who inspire me deeply are St. Oscar Romero, for his courage and commitment to justice, and St. Francis of Assisi, for his joyful simplicity and love for all creatures. A passage of Scripture that speaks to my heart is Micah 6:8: "Act justly, love tenderly, and walk humbly with your God." It's a simple but profound reminder of how we're called to live.

Looking forward, I pray that our parish communities will continue to grow in faith, hope, and love, welcoming everyone as part of God's family and boldly sharing the Gospel with the world around us.

Thank you for taking the time to get to know me a little better. I look forward to walking this journey of faith together with you all in the weeks and months (and years!) ahead.
