

Feast of St David, Patron of Wales - 1st March

Born probably in Cardigan about 520, he received his early training from St Illtyd. He attracted many postulants to the monasteries he founded, all of which were remarkable for the austerity of their rule of life. Consecrated bishop in Jerusalem, he was recognised as primate of Wales & established his see at Mynyw (Menevia), the monastery of which he was abbot and where he died in 588.




The Season of Lent

Cycle of Prayer: During Lent we are asked to pray for these intentions: candidates for the Sacraments; women; the needy and hungry of the world; penitents and wanderers. Memorias are not celebrated fully, but maybe commemorated by substituting the Collect for that of the Lenten Feria. At Lauds and Vespers, the Benedictus and Magnificat antiphons respectively, followed by the Collect of the Memoria, may be added after the Ferial Collect.

• The Custom of the Veiling of the Cross during Lent

Where the custom is lived, the crucifix and all other statues in the church are covered with a purple cloth without ornamentation from First Vespers on Passion Sunday to before the Easter Vigil.

What is the origin of the custom?

It may have derived from a practice in Germany in the ninth century of extending a large cloth before the altar from the beginning of Lent. This cloth, known as the "Hungertuch" or hunger cloth, hid the altar from the view of the people until the reading of the Passion on Wednesday of Holy Week at the words "the veil of the temple was rent in two." The veil in the temple of Jerusalem separated the Holy of Holies from the main body of the temple. Some scholars say the custom was a remnant of the ancient practice of ritually expelling public penitents from the church at the beginning of Lent.

After the custom of public penance fell into disuse and the entire congregation was symbolically incorporated into the order of penitents through the imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday, it was no longer possible to expel them from the church and so instead the altar, or "Holy of Holies", was shielded from view until they were reconciled with God at Easter. Later on, in the Middle Ages the images of crosses and saints were also covered from the start of Lent.

The custom of limiting this veiling to the last two weeks of Lent, appears in the Ceremonial of Bishops in the seventeenth century.

The great nineteenth-century Benedictine liturgist Dom Prosper Gueranger gives a mystical interpretation of the veiling, based on the Gospel of St John, which was formerly read on Passion Sunday. 'Just as Jesus hid himself from the Jews who wanted to stone him (cf. Jn 8:59), so by the veils he is now hidden from the world in preparation for the mysteries of his passion.' The statues of the saints are covered too since, if the Master himself is covered, so should be his servants.

Dom Gueranger also explains that while on the two feasts of the Finding and the Exaltation of the Holy Cross the cross is honoured as the throne of Christ's victory, with its veiling in Lent it speaks to us of his suffering and humiliation.

Another spiritual interpretation of the veiling is because in Christ's passion not only was his divinity obscured but so was, in a certain sense, his humanity.

He was so disfigured by the blows and scourges that he was hardly recognisable as a human being.

We read in the prophet Isaiah's depiction of the Suffering Servant, which has always been taken to refer to Christ: "As many were astonished at him - his appearance was so marred, beyond human semblance, and his form beyond that of the sons of men - so shall he startle many nations" (Is 52:14).

Likewise, we read in the psalm Jesus quoted while he hung on the cross: "But I am a worm, and no man; scorned by men, and despised by the people" (Ps 22:6).

So, in a sense, the veil hides Our Lord's divinity and humanity, as did the wounds suffered in his passion.

Vatican News

Pope prays for victims of natural disasters, hails healthcare workers in remarks after Angelus

Pope Francis prayed on Sunday for those who have died recently in natural disasters, for consolation for their families, and for support for those who assist them. In remarks following the Angelus prayer in St Peter's Square, the Holy Father looked especially to Madagascar, which has been struck by a series of cyclones; and to the Petropolis area of Brazil, which has been "devastated" by floods and landslides.

Batsirai (ANSA)

Cyclones in Madagascar: At least 14 people were killed in Madagascar this week by tropical storm Dumako, the state disaster relief agency said, as the island braces for another cyclone due to hit on Tuesday. Some 4,323 were displaced when Dumako made landfall in the east of the country on Tuesday, the disaster relief agency said late on Friday. They were being housed in 12 sites. The Indian Ocean island nation is going through its storm season. A total of 124 people were killed earlier this month when tropical cyclone Batsirai slammed the southeastern coast of the island. Another cyclone, Emnati, is forecast to hit close to the same area affected by Batsirai, said Nomenjanahary Mamy Andriamirado, a weather forecaster with the national meteorological service.

Brazil flooding: The death toll from mudslides and floods in Brazil's colonial-era city of Petropolis has risen to more than 120 people and is expected to increase further as the region reels from the heaviest rains in almost a century.

Heavy downpours in the afternoon Thursday, when the city recorded some 6 cm (2.36 inches) of rain, caused even more soil instability and disrupted efforts to find survivors and clean up the debris. Brazilian president Jair Bolsonaro has pledged federal assistance to help the area recover, after surveying the damage on Friday.

The heroism of health care workers: Pope Francis also noted the observance on Sunday of National Health Personnel Day in Italy, saying we must remember the many doctors, nurses, volunteers, and others who stand beside the sick, treating them, making them feel better, and assisting them in so many ways. Recalling that "nobody is saved alone," the Pope said, "in sickness we need someone to save us, to help us." The Holy Father recognized the "heroism" shown by health care workers during the Covid emergency while emphasizing that their heroism "remains every day." He then led the crowds in a round of applause, "and a big 'Thank you!" for health care workers.

Turkey continues to shelter 3.7 million Syrians

According to the Turkish government, there are around 3.7 million Syrians under temporary protection in Turkey. The Interior Minister Suleyman Soylu said in some regions, the Syrian population accounts for over 25 percent of the total. Turkey has accepted millions of Syrians fleeing a civil war since 2011. In many camps in southeastern Turkey, near the



Syrian border, immigrants were initially welcomed under an open door policy. In the past three years, nearly half a million Syrians have been voluntarily sent back to northern Syria controlled by the Turkish army.

Migrant situation desperate: Elsewhere, the migration situation in the region remains desperate. The International Organization for Migration (IOM) said this week that 245 illegal migrants were returned to Libya after being rescued off the coast last week. In the second week of February alone, 245 migrants were rescued at sea and returned to Libya. IOM also said that since the beginning of the year, 34 illegal migrants died and 87 others went missing off the Libyan coast on the Central Mediterranean route. So far this year, a total of 1,721 illegal migrants have been rescued and returned to Libya, including 150 women and 53 children. Libya is a preferred staging point for migrants who want to cross the Mediterranean Sea to European shores.
